
Who We Are

Dave Beach

In August of 2006 Dave Beach and I drove my 1967 Giulia Super "Hooligan" to Tulsa to deliver a proposal to the AROC board for a Convention to be held in Portland in 2009. David and I were to be the co-chairs. Dave navigated the first half of my 5000 + mile two-lane-blacktop adventure. Doug Zaitz navigated for me on the road home.

Dave and I had shared some Alfa adventures over the previous 18 years, but we were always driving in our own Alfas. It was Dave's first experience driving

a Giulia Super. It must have been transformative, as he came home and bought a red Super from Les Hurlock. It was to become his favorite Alfa.

I learned a lot about Dave in our four days on the road. First and foremost was that any Alfa adventure is better with Ice cream. We ate Ice cream at nearly every opportunity, Including a memorable chocolate sunday in Burns, OR, (a godsend after changing a flat tire in the heat on Stinking Water Pass).

Dave visited the Antique Store next door after Ice cream and negotiated the purchase of a wonderful old tin pedal car, for the Grandchild he hoped his daughter might have someday. We even had Ice cream at a parlor across from the Aspen City Hall, I have a picture to prove it.

Dave loved Road-Side-Diners, old classic Drive-Ins and road food in general. Our stop for Lunch at Dandy's Drive-In in Bend took more than an hour. Dandy's still had roller skating carhops. He was a perfect navigator for a two-lane-blacktop adventure.

Our road took us on Highway 20 to Ontario, OR, then into Idaho where we followed Highway 30 into Utah. We crossed the Logan Pass and dropped down to Bear Lake, stopping in Lake City for Huckleberry Ice cream. We

crossed into Wyoming, taking a rest break at the Fossil Butte National Monument. Dave had me drive by the original Penny's Department Store in Kemmer.

We crossed back into Utah via the Flaming Gorge National Recreation Area. Dave was driving on the pass outside Vernal, Utah when Hooligan was attacked by a big old Tom Turkey who was shepherding his harem across the road. Tom got the hens safely across, then came back in full display and

charged the car. Dave gave him a full symphony from Hooligan's Bosch horns. The Tom retreated, apparently, he thought better about attacking an Alfa on its own turf! Dave laughed so hard he could hardly drive!

Our trip from Vernal Utah took us across Colorado diagonally, with Ice cream stops in Aspen and Pueblo. Ice cream helped to cool us down in the non-air-conditioned Super when it got too hot inside. We topped 10,000 feet 5 different times and 12,000 feet on Independence Pass, before driving into the endless wheat fields of Kansas. The oil fields, lakes, reservoirs, puddles, and rolling stubble fields of Oklahoma finally took us into Tulsa.

Dave Beach and I shared many adventures in our Alfas; including co-

chairing the 2009 Convention in Portland. We also took another road trip driving a trailer full of old Alfas home from Detroit. We took turns writing and running AROO's popular "Old Super Tour" for 10 years.

We were friends for more than 40 years. We I will miss his enthusiasm, his knowledge, and his friendship.

I will remember him every time I have Ice cream!

Dave Beach

David Beach was a connoisseur of old cars. Over the years his interest and ownership spanned multiple vehicles. It included Austin Healey's, Jaguars, Ferarri's, Jeeps, Renaults, Porsches, Model A Hot Rods, PT Cruisers, Fords, Lincoln Town cars, and of course his beloved Alfa Romeos. He Had a soft spot for large American station wagons. He once told me that part of the selection process was being able to lay the rear seats flat, slide in a 4 x 8 sheet of plywood, and close the rear door. They became his substitute for a pickup truck on his and Kathy's blueberry farm. The last one he had was sold to a fellow in France, hopefully it is being used to escort tourists around Le Mans.

He enjoyed his sport cars and sport sedans but one of the appeals of the large cars was, because he had so many friends, he could stuff a bunch of them in and take off on an adventure. Like heading up towards Mt Hood for an alpine dinner in a log cabin. Good memories.

My wife and I met Dave and Kathy on a Bob McGill tour over forty years ago. In car terminology he was a "spark plug" kind of guy who helped move AROO on to new activities.

When the Seattle club held its first national convention in 1984 AROO had a large contingent that attended. Afterwards Dave said "we could do a convention" so a group of people coalesced around the idea and in 1987 with Dave as club president AROO held its first convention. Over the years he was on the Board of Directors multiple times. His proudest moments were when he could talk a new member in the club into taking his place on the board as his term expired.

Dave had multiple interests: sailboats, camping in their motorhome, snow birding in Arizona, geocaching, travel, OSU football, golfing... but *not* fishing, never could get him to go fishing.

On multiple sailboats charters in the San Juans and one to the BVIs Dave would comment on his dislike of motorboats, wind was far superior to diesel - until we both got old and could no longer scramble across the deck setting sails. Our last charter was a motorboat. In a final irony this last summer he bought a racing motorboat that was powered by a flat head Ford motor from the 1940s. He told me that once he saw the motor he couldn't resist buying it.

Dave led an interesting and very productive life, had a lot of good friends, and was always planning new adventures. His sudden passing caught us all by surprise, he will be missed by many.

Dave and his navigator had a great time, taking notes and enjoying the drive. We all shared a picnic lunch at Fern Ridge Lake, where Dave told me about his experience in the service in Vietnam as an engineer and his early career once he was stateside. Quite a life.


